These tactics include the recent success of spey casting techniques (which are not just for two-handed rods but also for eight and nine foot, singlehanded rods), but nymphing strategies as well and how to search for and locate fish. No one knows this better than John Sherman who, in addition to traveling regularly in California, Nevada, Arizona and Hawaii representing Simms fly fishing gear and Hatch Outdoors sales (especially their fine reels), has fished *a lot* for

John has presented to our clubs before and, because of his highly professional photography skills and his wonderful storytelling abilities, has impressed everyone in SoCal. While attending Chico State, John worked at the Powell Fly Shop and guided on the Feather and Sacramento Rivers for steelhead and salmon. Since then, John has fished the West Coast from Alaska to the Baja Peninsula for everything from steelhead, to salmon, stripers, black bass, trout and numerous blue water species. He has also hosted numerous trips around the globe, including taking fly fishers to such exotic locales as Australia, Russia, Iceland, Mexico, Canada, the Bahamas, Belize, Argentina and Indonesia. John is also a very accomplished outdoor

Alagnak River, Alaska – Alagnak Lodge Great Silver Salmon Fishing

Rich Peters, my son Pete and I flew north to Anchorage on Friday, the 22nd of August, arriving early in the afternoon and checked into the Coast International Inn that is conveniently located near the airport. Rich and I then took a trip to the new, very fancy Cabela's store to check it out.

With us on the flight up, and in the hotel, was WFF club member Jeff Wiese who, the next day, was going to fly out to a rustic lodge in Cold Bay, far out on the Aleutian chain. But he met us at the Pipers Lounge in the Coast International for drinks. Jeff was the person who introduced me to Alagnak Lodge years ago. He and I had first gone to Alaska's Katmai Lodge, but subsequently we both went to Alagnak, where, for many years (and up until just a few years ago), Jeff held the lodge records for both the largest king salmon, and the largest king caught on a fly. Months ago I had tried to convince him to join us at Alagnak this year, but his mind was set on going to Cold Bay. I do want to mention that Alagnak has been very supportive of Wilderness Fly Fishers and our conservation efforts through our Super Auction -- Alagnak has consistently donated two-for-one trips to WFF and we told them that the club appreciates their help and loyalty.

This was actually the fifth time I have fished the Alagnak, and this trip was, by far, the best: the most Coho (silvers), the largest Coho, and, because we were there the last week that the lodge was open, the river was mostly ours alone the whole week. As well, this late, there were almost no chum or pink salmon around to compete with the big silvers.

The next day, on Saturday the 23rd, we flew from Anchorage to King Salmon with no problems, but fog on the river held us up there for a couple of hours until Branch River Air felt it was safe to wind up the old 1954 deHavilland Beaver float plane for the last leg into the lodge.

Several of the guides were old friends from earlier trips (Scott, Dave, Ace, Mikey, and Blaine), which is always a sign of a well-run lodge. As well, Sheldon, the chef, and his assistant Debbie (a true baker- extraordinaire) had returned, and food was simply outstanding the entire week.

The next morning, Sunday, Pete and I headed out onto a wet and gray river with our guide, Trevor Covick, who usually guides with the lodge's head guide, Scott, in Washington during the fall and spring for steelhead. Both are expert spey casters, and their suggestions on my two-handed casting helped me a lot. Pete and I both limited out (three fish per day) in that first morning, as we did each and every morning, but we continued to catch and release for the rest of each day.

Rich, fishing with Blaine Davis, did equally as well only using flies (purple, chartreuse, and of course pink). I fished only pink the whole trip, as Pete did when fly casting, but he did use a drift rod with a Mepps Flying C spinner which he can cast a mile. When he did, he would catch a larger number of fish than I did.

By Tuesday morning, Pete and I, keeping bucks only, had 100 pounds of fillets in 2 freezer boxes for Pete to take back to Fish Brothers, the fish smoking company he works for full time in Blue Lake, California, which is near Arcata. The fishing got better and better throughout the week, with more and larger fish coming to us with every new tide. I don't know how many fish were caught, but I'll bet Rich and I caught 10 to 15 a day, and Pete probably twice as many; the size of these fish was up to 14 pounds. (As a bonus, I also caught a 25-inch rainbow.)

The only disappointment of the week was our fly-out to the famous Kulik River on Thursday for rainbows. It is a beautiful place to go with mountains on both sides, but apparently the sockeye had stopped dropping eggs during the week prior to our visit, and the big rainbows had probably moved from the river into the lake above. We saw nothing like the rainbow fishing I remembered from a trip there years ago.

But at the lodge this year, we experienced the best fishing for large, chrome bright salmon that I have ever experienced. The river itself is gorgeous with its usual eagles, beavers and bears in attendance, with all of us focused on the same thing: fish! And I can't wait for the first LA delivery of smoked fillets to arrive from up north.
