Flats Fishing

For more than two decades, Capt. Bruce Chard has made his love and commitment to fly fishing abundantly clear through countless activities and accomplishments. And without a doubt, his first love (after fly fishing) is teaching people – all kinds of people – how to fish, how to cast, how to see all the grace, charm and beauty in what we do and where we "do" it.

Bruce started fishing when he was 10-years-old, living in Venice, Florida, by tossing shrimp in the intercostal waterways. After moving to Pennsylvania, he saw a fly fishing magazine while he was still in his teens and loved the way the casting looked; he's been a devotee ever since. After graduating high school in the keystone state, Bruce moved immediately back to Florida and, at 18, started guiding in the Keys. His mentor was Jake Jordan, who was affiliated with the fly shop where Bruce had started working. Jake took young Bruce under his wing, introducing him to the many fly fishing icons he knew.

That was 24 years ago and Bruce's rise in the fly fishing world has been meteoric. From when he was certified as a Federation of Fly Fishers *Master Certified Fly Casting Instructor* while still in his early 20s, Bruce has been conducting multiple fly casting and fly fishing schools throughout the Florida Keys, the Bahamas, Mexico and Belize, and he's recently been expanding these schools to even wider world locations. He's also the Director of Fly Fishing School Operations for Bozeman, Montana-based Yellow Dog Fly Fishing Adventures.

MEET OUR NEW WFF PRESIDENT FOR 2016

An MTL Interview with CELIA CARROLL

2016 promises to see a lot of changes in the world of fly fishing, and here at Wilderness Fly Fishers we have already experienced a significant change in Club leadership. After serving two successful terms as President, Peter Haight decided it was time to hand the gavel off to someone else. And we are delighted that the "someone" who has accepted the hand-off is long time Club member and Trout in the Classroom (TIC) leader, Celia Carroll. Although she needs no introduction, we thought it might be interesting to ask Celia about her vision for the Club and a few other matters as she begins her term as President.

MTL: First of all, congratulations on becoming Club President and thank you for accepting this leadership responsibility on behalf of the Club. When you were growing up in Texas were you introduced to fishing at an early age? How did you first get involved with the sport of fishing?

Celia: Daddy took all of his children and any available nieces and nephews fishing, hiking and bird-watching. He taught me lifelong pleasures of sitting quietly and watching the beauty and drama of the natural world unfold. He could sit still for hours, until quail and roadrunners walked under his chair. And so today, I love to sit still on a streamside boulder and watch trout in their feeding lanes sorting through the stream of debris for a meal.

MTL: How and when did you first become involved with Wilderness Fly Fishers?

Celia: Larry and I joined the Club in the early 1980's, although I did not become active until our daughter was a teen.

MTL: Most every Club member knows about your longstanding role as the leader of our Trout in the Classroom Program and, of course, the huge expansion of that program under your leadership. What other roles and activities have you performed at WFF?

Celia: Over the years I have participated on the Board of Directors; the Double Haul Ball; numerous WFF outings; the Mammoth Fly Fishing Faire where I helped register participants; the Super Canyon Sweep for the East and West Forks of the San Gabriel River where Larry and I volunteer almost every year. When WFF participated in the annual beach cleanup – we volunteered for that – ever since, I pick up a mile of trash whenever we go surf fishing.

Volunteering for WFF outings and projects often yielded up surprises and opportunities to learn new skills: I have emptied traps of invasive crayfish for the Malibu Creek conservation project; picked up roadside trash on a stretch of Highway 395 south of Mammoth when WFF Adopted-a-Highway; helped serve over 100 sandwiches at the Double Haul Ball a couple of times; took my first excursion wearing snowshoes with Mary Jo Dalton at Alpers Ranch. I've also been part of a team of Dept. of Fish and Wildlife staff and WFF volunteers scrambling our way up Silver Creek [California] capturing electro-shocked brookies to help endangered Lahontan cutthroat trout regain viable habitat; witnessed an intense Trico hatch on the Bighorn River in Montana while on a WFF trip to Leaning Tree Lodge; and sung "Goodnight Irene" with George Patterson and others around a campfire at Kelsey Lake. I have served as Board Secretary for the last year, and, of course, I followed the 18-year stewardship of Jim Solomon and Jim Drummond as Coordinator for our TIC program.

MTL: Do you feel that your 41 years as a public librarian have helped you in the roles that you have had with the Club?

Celia: I use my librarian-ly skills often when researching material to bring to our work in the Trout in the Classroom schools. Three years ago, we added Culver City Middle School to the program so now all three seventh-grade classes of more than 500 students participate in TIC. As a public librarian, I was often a storyteller, and gave as many as eight storytimes a week to kids six weeks old to age 12 when school classes visited. I use that experience to now talk to kids in local schools about the amazing rainbow trout and the wonders of our California wild places.

MTL: Last year you took a guided trip on the Lower Owens River with Pat Jaeger using a Tenkara rod and technique for the first time. Was that a game changer for you in terms of fly fishing? How successful was the outing and do you intend to continue using the Tenkara technique in the future?

Celia: Tenkara fly fishing is great fun! I like its simplicity, and the way it lets me use the fly

or nymph to mimic insect behavior. Bishop guide Pat Jaeger introduced me to Tenkara fishing on the WFF outing to the Lower Owens last February. I quickly learned how to cast to the feeding lanes for browns and rainbows. The Tenkara casting technique gives a nice long drift with the ability to jiggle that fly and tempt fish! It's a great method for those of us who like to be in the moment on a beautiful stream without thinking excessively about technique. I have a Tenkara rod now which I used most recently on the Club Hot Creek trip in October.

New WWF President

MTL: We know that you like to combine bird watching with fly fishing. Of all of the places that you have visited, what is your favorite location for fishing and birding, and why?

Celia: The West Fork of the San Gabriel River is only an hour away, in the Angeles National Forest. The canyon is deep, cool and secluded, so trout are happy there most of the year. I have encountered twin teenage mountain lions, a black bear, gray fox, and bobcat, as well a healthy array of mountain quail, band-tailed pigeons, and canyon wrens, to name just a few! The canyon walls host plant communities which rarely occur so far south including red columbine, leopard lilies, mariposa lilies, and many more. There are many great fishing and wildlife-watching opportunities in our local mountains. Los Angeles has the greatest spread of wild land on its borders of any U.S. city! I will never see it all, but it is sure fun to try!

MTL: Turning to matters relating to your new administrative role on behalf of the Club, what is your vision of the Club during 2016 and beyond? Are you planning to make any significant changes either in terms of Club policies, the way meetings are held, recruitment of new members, or any other significant Club matters?

Celia: Like many long-lived clubs, WFF has lost membership and participation in its events and functions in recent years. Going forward, I believe we can be most successful by responding to our membership, and publicizing ourselves to the wider Southern California fishing community. Three members, John Kingsley, Leslie Riley and I completed a member survey last October. Our membership, though smaller than past years, is active, loves our sport and responds to the opportunities the Club offers. However, because we are a small group, the number of people who can free up time for Club responsibilities and events is also small. When we had 140 members five years ago, there was an adequate pool of people who were available for events and offices. An outing often had 8–10 participants; today, we must work to attract 5 - 6 people.

To continue to offer monthly dinners with an outstanding slate of speakers and to subsidize skills clinics with people such as Pat Jaeger and Ernie Gulley, we need to raise money and boost attendance at our monthly dinner meetings. It's a good year for members to bring guests to dinner meetings, and consider making added donations during membership renewal time. We are hoping for 100% renewals before the March 31 deadline so we know how to plan and pay for our activities. We also have a new Membership Group, formed under Reece Lewis' and Leslie Riley's leadership, which will focus on new member recruitment strategies. I have high hopes for ideas coming from that group, as well as our enlarged Outings Group, financial planners, and the Future-of-the-Club Planning Group.

MTL: What do you like most about the Club, and what aspect of the Club do you believe is most in need of improvement?

Celia: My favorite thing about WFF is the way we form friendships based on a sport we love, and the experiences we share in the beautiful places trout live! The Club needs wider participation by members – there is so much talent we can tap – and I'll be tapping on shoulders! So, the thing I least like is that a small group of Board members has had to keep the basic functions of the Club running for many years, without an infusion of new talent. We plan to change that this year.

MTL: Finally, if you were a fish and could live any place in the world, what kind of fish would you want to be and where would you live?

Celia: I like the way the sailfish slashes through the deep oceans, herding shimmering schools of sardines and flashing his amazing colors! Now THAT is a fish in whose scale-y skin I would like to swim for awhile!



The classroom sessions at the ONE GENERATION CENTER cover everything from knot tying to choosing the correct flies. At the nearby pond in Reseda Park you will learn the essential casts to prepare you to fish in rivers, lakes or our local beaches. SPFF supplies loaner rods and reels to get you started. The classes are run by certified instructors and experienced Club members. The first four Saturday morning classes are March 12 thru April 2 with a special graduation class in Bishop, CA on April 9th.

Classes start at 8.30 am and run until 12 noon.
